#### A LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Dear Friends,

Thank you for making 2016 yet another remarkable year for CGEIN! This year marked our fifth year of **service** in this sector. Our dedicated staff and volunteers have done an incredible job at expanding our outreach while strengthening our programs and services. We have once again been able to increase the value of projects delivered directly in the field by 25%.

Our 2016 projects highlights include:

- UN CSW Side Event we Co- Hosted a side event with Network of Women's Rights Ghana (NETRIGHTS) at the United Nations Commission on the Status of Women, New York. Theme: Inclusive Partnership and Sustainable Development: Localising the Global Goals to protect women's livelihoods (March, 2016).
- Girls' Education Advocacy and Research Network (GEARN) PROJECT This was a research project funded by British Council. We undertook the study in six selected Science Technical School Board (STSB) schools in **Kano state** principally to achieve three objectives visà-vis reviewing science achievement with gender lens, identify stakeholders views toward girls' and boys' achievement in science (Biology, Chemistry, Physics) and mathematics, find out factors that are both supportive as well as obstructive to science and mathematics for girls or boys, and recommend measure to address the problems. (January to August 2016).
- Women & Girls Community Empowerment Program (WOGICEP): Ministry of Gender, Children and Social Protection, Eastern Region office, Ghana partnered with us to build the capacity of the members of Fire Ladies Association of Eastern Region (Koforidua), Ghana under our regional community empowerment program for women and girls. We facilitated a capacity training workshop for the association members in Koforidua on fundraising. We will train FISLA members in other regions on a rolling basis (August 2016).
- Baseline Study VOICE Project: We were selected as the inaugural research partner for the OXFAM VOICE project, with a funding support from OXFAM NOVIB CGEIN carried out the Baseline Study for the project. VOICE is an OXFAM's multi-country project aimed at amplifying the voices of the most marginalized and discriminated members of the society so that their demands and concerns are heard by policy makers. VOICE will strengthen the capacity of Civil Society Organizations and representatives of these groups to increase their (political) participation in mainstream development processes, since these groups are often hard to reach via regular programming. We carried out the baseline study in Kano, Lagos, Enugu, Plateau, Adamawa, Plateau and FCT the six geopolitical zones: (August to December, 2016).
- 16 days Activism Online Campaign: This year, we joined other anti-Violence Against Women & Girls (VAWG) organisations around the world to observe the 16 Days of Activism with an e- campaign themed "16 on behalf of 16". E- campaigns has become our annual input to

the international 16 Days of Activism against gender based violence. During the 16 days period, we published a type of violence against women and girls in Nigeria per day. Each post presented a short narrative of a type of violence, possible solutions and a call to action for prevention and eradication of that type of violence. Our goal for this year's campaign was to educate current non- activists and persuade them to get involved in their own space! (**November - December 2016**).

Our ongoing goal is to sustain our gains in 2016 while increasing our projects. You can truly help make this possible! CGEIN is stronger than ever due to our continually commitment to hardwork and networking. We salute our board members who donated time, resources, and talent in support of our important mission. Our Advisory Board has assisted us in expanding our vision and perspectives.

I am so excited about the coming year; we will work more in rural communities with women and girls. We shall also work to empower older women and also ultimately work with policy makers. Therefore we invite you to work with us in 2017. We invite you to follow us on our social media platforms, make a donation to support our work before the year ends, recommend us to funding agencies, send us suggestions and ultimately always wish us well!






